Women's History Month



Amelia Earhart

As we begin the month of March, it occurs to us that this is the month to celebrate Women's History. I chose to enlighten us on a brave and adventurous young lady named Amelia Earhart. Amelia was born on July 24, 1897 in Atchison, Kansas. She grew up as a bit of a Tomboy and was used to disputing what was acceptable behavior for a female. She would climb trees, hunt rats with a .22 rifle, and ride a snow sled on her belly. Flying never entered her mind though.

The first time she saw a real plane, she was 10 years old and it was made of wood and rope- she was not impressed. However, a decade later at a Stunt Flying Exhibition- flying really grabbed her attention and it stuck. Amelia took her first flying lesson in 1921 and quickly saved enough money to buy her own plane- a Two Seater Bi-plane-, which she painted yellow and named Canary. She used this plane to set her first record for rising higher than 14000 feet. In 1928 Amelia decided to set the record for being the first Woman to fly over the Atlantic Ocean. She flew in a group to include Bill Stultz and Slim Gordon. The trip was successful and upon their return they were met with a Ticker-Tape Parade in New York and dinner with President Calvin Coolidge. Amelia was as famous in her time as Taylor Swift is today. Amelia was nicknamed "Lady Lindbergh" after she made one of the same flights as Lindbergh himself a decade prior. Amelia's final flight was on July 2, 1937 near her 40th B-Day. She wanted to be the first female to fly around the world. Her last radio transmission was at 8:45 am and she was never heard from again. She vanished completely. This is still a mystery today.
